FALL HOLY DAYS

Summer is quickly coming to an end and Yahweh's people are preparing for His fall Holy Days: Feast of Trumpets, Day of Atonement, Feast of Tabernacles, and the Eighth Day. Yahweh's feast days are considered "harvest festivals." They occur in spring, summer, and fall. Much can be said about all the Holy Days, but we will concentrate on the first two that occur in fall. The Feast of Trumpets and Day of Atonement are very important.

In the Hebrew, Feast of Trumpets is known as *Yom Teruah*, and Day of Atonement is called *Yom Kippur*. The Feast of Trumpets is always observed on the first new moon of the seventh month. Scripture mentions the blowing of trumpets quite frequently. In Revelation the angels sound seven trumpets announcing a plague or dramatic occurrence preceding the return of Yahshua Messiah. Many of these plagues are similar to what the Egyptians faced in Moses' day because they wouldn't obey Yahweh.

Day of Atonement is unique in that it's the only Holy Day we are commanded to afflict our souls by fasting for twenty four hours. Fasting means we don't consume and food or water (or any liquids). The Hebrew name *Yom Kippur* implies "covering." Yahshua's blood is the covering or atonement for our lawbreaking or sins today. Day of Atonement is a very solemn day. All the other feasts are joyful observances, except Passover which is also a solemn observance, but not a High Day.

When we keep Yahweh's Holy Days, we accept His sovereignty in our lives. Each of the holy days show us a part of Yahweh's plan. Keeping man's pagan days do not. Let us plan now to observe the days that Yahweh intended us to keep.

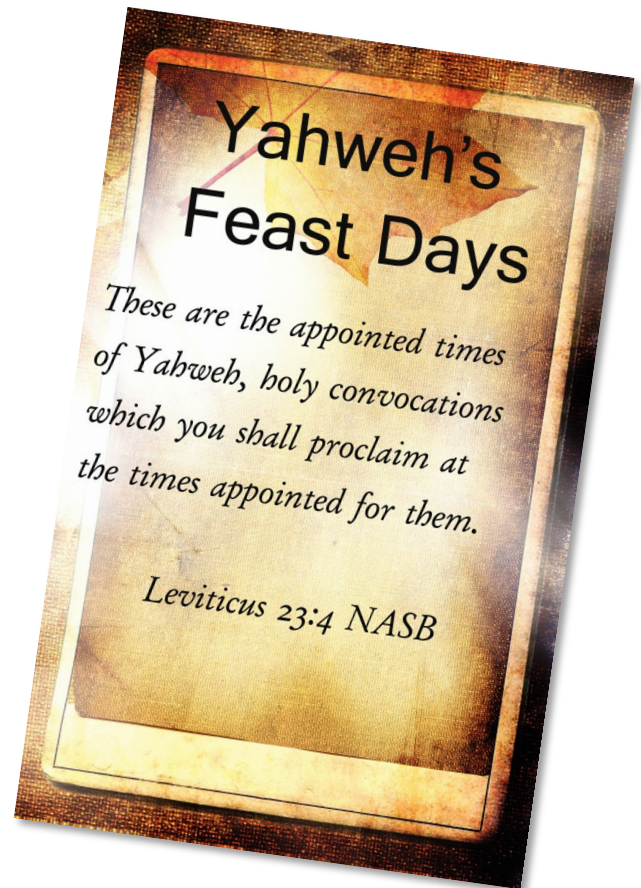

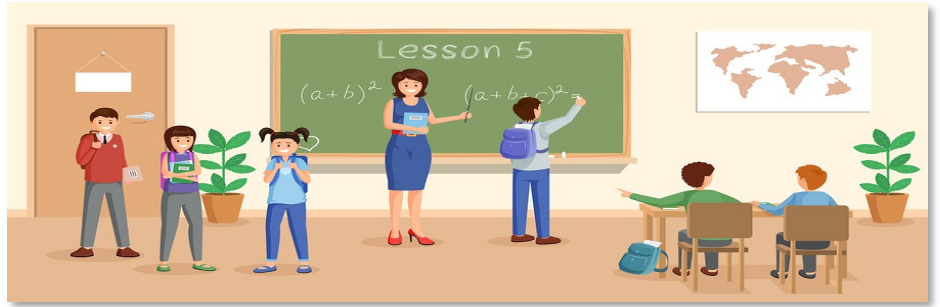
